Electors are invited to contribute to the agenda and/or celebrate local activities and debate current issues in the community. Electors are also invited to raise any issues they want to bring to the attention of the Town Council for future consideration by the Town Council.

The Annual Meeting of the Town

1. Requirement

Every English town or parish must have a town/parish meeting, which consists of the local government electors registered for the area for which it is held. The Annual Town Meeting is the meeting where the parish council report to its electorate on what it has accomplished in the preceding year.

The Annual Town Meeting may not start earlier than 6:00pm. (LGA 1972 s 14 (4))

2. Chair

The meeting should be chaired by the Chairman or Town Mayor or in their absence the Vice Chairman or Deputy Town Mayor. LGA 1972 ss 17(1))

However, there is no requirement for the Town Mayor to attend a meeting of the town but they are entitled to attend. LGA 1972 s 16

If neither the Town Mayor or Deputy Town Mayor are present then those electors present may appoint a chairman for the meeting. LGA 1972 ss 17(3)

3. Role of Councillors

Although it is not mandatory for the Councillors to attend they would usually attend and will speak if need be. However, the purpose of the meeting is to enable the residents to have their say. Councillors will listen with interest and if they are residents themselves will have the opportunity to raise questions and make comments if they wish.

4. Role of the Town Clerk

There is no requirement for the Town Clerk to attend the Annual Town Meeting unless it is their contract of employment that they attend.

If required to attend they should attend the Annual Parish Council Meeting as the proper officer of the council unless a leave of absence has been agreed.

5. Minutes of the Meeting

The minutes of meetings of the town are kept separately from those of the town council. They are to be kept in a book specially provided for the purpose. LGA 1972 ss 19(1)

The minutes of the previous meeting should be signed by the person who chaired the previous Annual Town Meeting.

6. Dates

The Town meeting must assemble annually between 1 March and 1 June (both inclusive) on a date decided by the Town Council. Proceedings must not begin before six o'clock in the evening. In an election year, it is recommended that it is held after the election.

7. How convened

The Annual Town Meeting is usually called by the Town Mayor of the town council. However, any town meeting may be called by... (LGA 1972 s 15 (1))

- The Town Mayor of the town council,
- · Any two Councillors from the town,
- Any six registered electors from the town.

Proper notice of the meeting must be given not less than seven clear days before the meeting. This must specify the time and place, the business to be transacted at the meeting, and it must be signed by the person(s) convening the meeting. The notice must be posted in some conspicuous place or places or given in such a manner that it will give publicity to the meeting.

The time and place of the meeting is specified: it must not be held before 6:00 p.m. and must not be held in premises used for the supply of alcohol (unless there are no other suitable venues).

8. Purpose

Electors, public and press are invited to hear reports from the Town Mayor, Unitary Councillors, community groups and any organisation that the town council has funded during the year.

The Council may also invite local community groups including those who have received substantial grant funding from the Town Council.

The first part of the formal meeting with speeches and presentations normally lasts about one hour depending on those present, the number of questions raised and the discussion that follows. After the formal session, the meeting is open to groups such as to local clubs, societies and other voluntary and statutory organisations to provide an exhibition and/or a representative to speak about the work of their group.

9. Decisions/Voting

Decisions are taken in the first instance by a majority of those present and voting.

Initially voting on a question is done by a majority of those present at the meeting and the decision of the person chairing the meeting as to the decision is final unless a poll is demanded. LGA 1972 ss 18(2). (see para 12)

No votes taken at this meeting are binding on the town council although they should consider them at the next meeting of the town council. Only members on the electoral roll can vote on an issue. Other members of the public can attend and express their opinions but not vote.

10. How are they Conducted

Many town and parish councils make this meeting a community event by providing refreshments, presentations from community groups and providing an informal atmosphere.

There should be an opportunity for the public and press to express their opinions on what the council are doing during the meeting.

11. Legal status

Though the town meeting may discuss town affairs its resolutions differ in their legal consequence. In a few cases a resolution is legally binding. In all others, a resolution is persuasive only; the town council may legally disregard it and leave the electors to their remedy at the next election.

12.1 The Call for a Poll

A poll may be demanded before the end of a town meeting on any question arising at the meeting, but no poll shall be held unless the person presiding at the meeting consents to it or the poll is demanded by ten or one third of the local government electors present (whichever figure is the less) call for it.

The town meeting does not vote on whether or not to have a poll once this call has been made.

The poll is a poll of the local government electors of the town; there is no provision for a ward poll.

12.2 The Question

The meeting does, however, vote on the question which is to be put in the poll, and each local government elector present may give one vote and no more on any question.

The proposer of the question becomes a key figure in the subsequent poll and the proposer's name and address will need to be recorded by the proper officer (clerk) of the meeting.

The form of words used in the question itself is also important. The Town Mayor should ensure that the question can be voted for either 'yes' or 'no'. The question should not lend itself to vague or double-negative answers.

Once the wording has been agreed at the meeting, the question cannot be changed.

12.3 The Returning Officer is notified

The Town Mayor or chairman of the meeting has a duty to provide the Returning Officer (Chief Executive of Wiltshire Council) with, the question, the name and address of the proposer of the question and the date of the town meeting.

The Returning Officer will consider whether a poll shall be held, and in most cases the Returning Officer's duties will be clear cut.

12.4 Case Law

However, in the case of Bennet. v Chappell (1965 - 3 WLR 829), the Court of Appeal recognised that a parish poll requested for a purpose that was 'devoid of practical application' might not be granted. Clearly, a question of whether there should be a referendum on the constitution of 'Ruritania' or a war against 'Ruritania' would be 'devoid of practical application' as far as a town or parish council would be concerned. The poll can serve as an instruction to the town or parish council to do or to desist from doing something that is within its power, and there would be no practical application in asking the electorate to vote on a question that was wholly outside the remit of the council.

In the case of Letchworth Garden City Heritage Foundation v (1) the Returning Officer for the District of North Hertfordshire and (2) the Chairman of the Parish Meeting of Letchworth Garden City (2009), the High Court considered the history and purpose of parish meetings and the possible meanings of the phrase 'parish affairs'. Whilst this case did not define or give modern examples of what would constitute 'parish affairs', it indicated that the High Court is likely to view a parish affair as any matter specific to a parish in which the local government electors in that parish have a legitimate and genuine interest.

In this case, the Claimant Foundation judicially reviewed a poll organised by the first Defendant, being the District Council's returning officer. The Claimant Foundation owned the estate of Letchworth Garden City, and the area was within the jurisdiction of Hertfordshire County Council, Letchworth Garden City Town Council and the Claimant Foundation. There was tension in the local community between those who regarded the Claimant Foundation as effective and the town council as redundant, and others who wished see the Foundation replaced by a directly elected body. At an assembly of the parish meeting, there were discussions as to whether the Claimant Foundation's governance structures should be changed. The next day, the 2nd Defendant being the Chairman at the assembly of the parish meeting (and the Chairman of the town council) notified the district council of a request for a poll on the issue. The Claimant Foundation argued that the poll, and by extension the parish meeting or discussions by the parish meeting in respect of Foundation's governance structures, were beyond the parish council's powers, because the governance of the Foundation was not a 'parish affair' within the meaning of section 9 of Local Government Act 1972. The Foundation's claim was unsuccessful. As some of the Foundation's governors were appointed or elected from within the parish, the High Court held that the parish had a straightforward and obvious role to play in the Claimant Foundation's governance. The High Court held that the Foundation's governance structures and any change in those nominated from within the parish to serve as governors of the Foundation fell within the definition of the term

'parish affairs, were properly the subject of discussion by the parish meeting and properly the subject of the poll.

12.5 Preparations for the Poll

The poll must take place between 14 and 25 days after the poll was demanded, with the publication of the question.

All costs in relation to the poll must be met by the Town Council.

Note: The Annual Parish Meeting is a SEPARATE meeting from the Town Council's Annual Meeting. The Annual Town Meeting should be a relatively informal event for the community whereas the Annual Meeting of the Town Council is a formal council meeting.

1/21 Welcome from the Town Mayor

The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard welcomed members of the public and press to the Annual Town Meeting and informed those present that this was an opportunity for the Town Council to report on progress made over the last year, and give members of the public an opportunity to question councillors on local issues.

The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard spoke of articles recently in the local press regarding King George V Park and confirmed that at the Full Council meeting held on 17 May 2021 decisions were made on how the Council manages the work in King George V Park. No decisions were made on the work itself. The issue will be

discussed in more detail at the Asset Management and Amenities Committee meeting on 21 June 2021. The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard stated that members of the public are welcome to attend.

2/21 Minutes

It was proposed by the Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard, seconded by Councillor S Crundell and

RESOLVED that the minutes of the Annual Town Meeting held on 29 April 2021, having previously been circulated, were approved as a correct record and were signed by the Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard.

3/21 Melksham Town Council

The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard stated that 13 of the 15 councillors for Melksham were new councillors. Each councillor then introduced themselves. The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard offered those present the opportunity to ask questions of the new councillors, no questions were put.

4/21 Policing in Melksham

Sgt James Twyford provided a presentation on work undertaken by the police over the past year and confirmed proposed interventions and priorities for the forthcoming year. Sgt Twyford confirmed how ongoing work with various neighbourhood groups and the excellent working relationship with Melksham Town Council had helped to reduce crime in Melksham.

Terri Welch asked for an update on the Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs). The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard confirmed that the SIDS will be in place by mid-June.

There were no further questions from members of the public.

5/21 Reports from Groups who received grants during the year

Reports were received from twenty-nine groups who had received grants during the year.

6/21 Presentations from Community Groups

The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard confirmed that the reports provided by the Area Board and 4Youth Melksham were included in the agenda pack.

2385 (Melksham) Air Training Corps

Flight Lieutenant Greg McKay provided a presentation explaining the variety of practical and outdoor activities that took place over the last year in Covid-safe

environment, with support from community groups and the public sector The full range of training and activities will commence after 21 June 2021.

Community Response

Philippa Huxtable, the Age Friendly Co-ordinator, gave a presentation on the work carried out by 465 volunteers during the last year throughout the Covid-19 pandemic. Services provided during lock-down ranged from collecting prescriptions and shopping, to providing Christmas lunches, which has helped build relationships within the community. Community support work will continue for the residents of Melksham with a new face-to-face video service being launched, the provision of a volunteer companion scheme, and the continuation of friendly phone calls.

Melksham in Bloom

Terri Welch provided a presentation and since Bloom commenced in Melksham over ten years ago, the town has received three Gold awards from the South West in Bloom competition and is aiming for gold again this year.

Terri reported on Town Tidy days for litter picking, works undertaken with the Town Council's Amenities team, volunteers and Melksham Town Council's plans to take over the Friends' Garden.

Priority for People

The Economic Development Manager, David McKnight, provided a presentation on the Priority for People initiative explaining that this was a project which has arisen from the Strategic Plan, Melksham 2020-2036. Priority for People will be launched on 7 June 2021 through a public survey and details can be found on the website www.priorityforpeople.org

Neighbourhood Plan

The Town Clerk explained that the Neighbourhood Plan was a joint plan covering the boundary of Melksham Town and Melksham Without Parish Council. Neighbourhood Plans are community led planning which go through several stages of scrutiny. Melksham's Plan has taken seven years to get to referendum stage. The referendum will be held on 1 July 2021 and requires a 51% yes vote to be successful; that is 51% of the people voting not the total electorate. If successful the Plan will go into an immediate review which will focus on the Town Centre Masterplan Plan, Local Green Space, Housing Site Allocation, implications of the by-pass proposal and the Melksham Canal Link. The plan is available on the Melksham Town Council website at https://bit.ly/2SzxHgF

The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard confirmed that, if adopted, the Neighbourhood Plan will protect Melksham from any reduction in a three/ five-

year land supply, and would increase the Community Infrastructure Levy contribution from 15% to 25%.

Adrienne Westbrook stressed the large amount of work required to produce the plan, the importance of the document and the importance of the referendum taking place on 1 July 2021. It gives the opportunity to shape how Melksham housing will develop in the future.

Councillor Ellis and Terri Welch thanked the Town Clerk, Adrienne Westbrook and officers for their hard work on the Neighbourhood Plan.

7/21 Open Forum/Questions from Electors

Questions from Electors:

Richard Wiltshire had asked in advance if the Town Council, through its' Health Working Group, could press the NHS to provide additional services at Melksham Hospital for local patients. Visiting consultants and practitioners would reduce the need for people to attend the RUH Bath and other larger hospitals, thus reducing the pressure on these facilities.

The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard explained that at the annual meeting of the Town Council on 17 May 2021 membership of the Health Working Group had been discussed. Council were looking to work in partnership with the Wiltshire Council Health Group, that Councillor Nick Holder of the Area Board is establishing, to work with stakeholders and providers. The Chief Executive of the CCG will be in attendance. The Council will support and encourage the NHS in maximising GP services within the town and services to Melksham Hospital.

Adrienne Westbrook expressed concern about amendments to the Terms of Reference for the King George V Park Sub Committee. The Terms of Reference gave delegated authority for spending to the Group not exceeding £501,000, ring fenced for improvements to the Park. Adrienne Westbrook stated she was concerned that the delegated powers for spending had been removed from the KGV Sub Committee when there were still outstanding projects to be completed.

The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard confirmed there had been no amendment to the budget and that funding was still ring-fenced for use in that or any other project.

The Town Clerk stated that the Terms of Reference for the new committee had not yet been drafted. The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard confirmed that the name of the committee had been changed as agreed at the Town Council Meeting held on 17 May 2021, but that the Terms of Reference could not be changed until they had been amended and approved at Full Council.

From Zoom

Pam Wiltshire asked the Town Council to support the Trees for Jubilee Campaign. She also mentioned that she was concerned that the subject of the Council's Tree Wardens had not been included on the agenda for the Council Meeting held on 17 May 2021 and hoped that their use would be reinstated.

The Town Mayor, Councillor Hubbard advised Mrs Wiltshire that both topics would be added to future Council Agendas for consideration.

Paul Johnson from TransWilts gave a verbal update on improvement works undertaken and scheduled at Melksham Station which included re-opening the Café, opening the Melksham Hub. He advised that cycle hire is available from the station and commented on reductions in greenhouse gases achieved through the use of electric vehicle charging points.

Wiltshire Councillor Report for Melksham Town Council Annual Town Meeting to be held on 28 March 2022

May 2021 was the start of a very steep learning curve for me as I entered the world of Wiltshire council. I felt very humbled and privileged to have been elected, especially from a field of some very worthy opponents. One of my first feelings was one of great responsibility and I took part in the thorough induction training provided, willingly and enthusiastically.

Some of the main concerns brought to my attention by residents of Melksham East were and remain:

- Antisocial behaviour.
- Speeding.
- Littering.

I am pleased to be able to work with the members of Melksham Town Council representing Melksham East on these issues.

Some specific issues I have worked on have been:

- the opening of the playground in Gladstone Road.
- the installation of white lines on Gladstone Road where antisocial parking had been taking place.
- the installation of a bollard on the cycle path between Heather Avenue / Dorset Crescent.
- the installation of temporary lighting on entrance to Oakfield's stadium from Eastern Way.
- requesting a metro count for Skylark Road.

I am currently working to:

- enhance the public open space between Primrose nature reserve and Eastern Way.
- install a footpath behind the Oaks school.
- upgrade the current public rights of way between Eastern Way and Primrose Nature Reserve into a proper cycle path.

Currently I am working with Councillor Louisa Lewis and others to represent to GreenSquareAccord concerns raised by residents over maintenance charges and the quality of work undertaken on properties.

I am also talking to Brook Banks about the public open space adjacent to Forest and Sandridge school and representing resident's concerns about the proposed extension of Forest and Sandridge school.

Another exciting work steam is in supporting Melksham Town Council officers in their attempts to resolve the outstanding issue of a new community hall for the East of Melksham development.

At Wiltshire Council, I currently serve on:

- Children's Select Committee
- Health Select Committee
- Standards Committee
- Audit Committee

As a member of these committees I have served on a number of rapid scrutiny exercises, which have included the following:

- A GAP analysis of housing provision for care leavers
- A review of LGA model code of conduct to consider whether it should be adopted by Wiltshire Council. This scrutiny is ongoing, but the LGA model code of conduct has already been adopted by Calne Town Council.

It is always a pleasure to work with officers and members of Melksham Town Council, all of whom are dedicated professional and helpful, and who are supportive whenever I bring an issue to the town council for their attention/consideration.

I believe the residents of Melksham are best served by a good working relationship between Melksham Town Council and Wiltshire Council at both officer and member level, and I look forwards to working during the coming years on that basis.

The Council's very generous grant of £782.25 towards this project in September 2021 has allowed us to cover all the requested costs to date, leaving us with a small sum (£9.69 - equal to the sessional costs for one of our specialist Support Staff) that will be spent by 31st March 2022.

The grant has enabled our team of trained specialists and volunteers to run a series of Movement for the Mind sessions in Bowerhill over the last 6 months for people from across Melksham who live with dementia and their carers (who are often also family members). Our Movement project has two aims: to improve the physical condition of those living with dementia; to reduce social isolation for local people living with dementia and their carers. One of the most debilitating side-effects of a dementia diagnosis can be the increasing social isolation on both those living with the condition and their carers become increasingly risk-averse and unwilling to step outside. Movement for the Mind combats this by offering a safe environment where people can enjoy themselves and socialise without feeling stigmatised or nervous of how other people may react.

Sadly, we have not yet been able to open this clinic due to the impact of the outbreak of the Omicron variant of the coronavirus pandemic. We were so thrilled to receive this grant at the end of Sept 2021, and immediately began researching and making plans to introduce this clinic in a central Melksham location. However, our plans were curtailed when the new variant hit our area: re-introduced safety restrictions meant the set-up of a new community-based clinic was not safe or wise, and the additional pressure on the NHS and our local healthcare network led to our reduced capacity to further this project. For example, between January and February 2022, multiple members of our clinical teams took on extra shifts to enable the safe discharge of more local patients from hospital into their own homes to reduce the potential risk of them catching Omicron whilst in hospital. The clinical staff who would have been involved in setting up the new clinic simply didn't have the capacity to do so.

However, we remain 100% committed to introducing this new clinic very soon. A clinical project manager is in the process of liaising with potential venues, promotional banners are being produced, and we very much hope the new clinic will be up and running during April 2022.

We are also delighted to tell you that we have secured further funding from two separate charitable trusts for this clinic, meaning it will be fully funded for at least 12 months. This funding is part of a wider package which is enabling us to set up a total of 10 clinics across our region in the months ahead. The Melksham clinic will be one of the first two clinics to be introduced.

Many of our children have sensory issues due to early childhood trauma and Craft'ernoon sessions offer them an opportunity to fulfil their sensory needs, whilst spending time with other adopted children. It also offers parents an opportunity to meet and talk to other adoptive parents.

Adoption can be isolating for both our children and us as parents as there can still be misconceptions, and unkind judgment. To have access to activities like this can be a lifeline for some families – a rare moment when you are not "the different family" in the room.

We have engaged with local artists and health and wellness practitioners to include activities which support good mental health (for example mindfulness, sensory integration, self-esteem boost, etc.) for our Craft'ernoon sessions and holiday workshops up to June 2022.

The Craft'ernoon session delivered in February 2022 was a heart-warming success, with children delighting in sensory paint (using all medium but a brush to paint, mixing spices with paint for olfactory stimulation and shaving foam marble painting for a lot of fun) – and parents delighting in the mess not being at home!

Unfortunately, due to Covid, we were not able to hold our Christmas Party and Craft'ernoon sessions in December 2021 and January 2022.

Additionally, due to ill-health, we were not able to organise a Holiday Workshop during the February 2022 half-term.

We have also received unexpected donations of art and craft supplies which enabled us to purchase very little materials for the Craft'ernoon session we held in February 2022 (£6.97 out of the £40 we had allocated)

We would be very grateful if consideration could be given to us using this money toward a Climate Emergency Drama Workshop and a Craft Workshop during the Easter holidays. This would be combined with using funding allocated for a Holiday Workshop during the Easter holidays.

This would support our planned Family Celebration Day in late May 2022 to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee. On the day attendees will be invited to create "Trees of Hope".

Inspired by the River of Hope, our focus for the "Trees of Hope" will also be hope for the future with a spotlight on the environment and protecting the planet – and the part we can all play.

Using their own hand as a leaf shape children will use colours and designs to share their hope for the next 70 years. All the children's hands (leaves) together will form large colourful trees – reinforcing the message that one small thing one does can lead to something great, and ensuring our children feel an important part of the day.

We are using a tree as it has powerful meaning for us - roots (so important for our children) but also branches reaching for the sky (aspiration). Also, we could not take part in tree planting for this event, and this enables us to offer a nod to the Queen's Green Canopy.

The Climate Emergency Drama Workshop would culminate in children creating some "sample" handprint leaves which will be used during the Celebration Day as examples, to help provide inspiration.

The Craft Workshop would enable us to produce the support (trunks) of the trees, using mostly recycled and repurposed materials.

The funding has helped towards our core work. The Trust provides free home security and online safety services to the over 60s and 18+ registered disabled who have become victims of house crime or online fraud, or are at risk of becoming a victim, and victims of domestic abuse. The key objectives are:

- Improving security of domestic premises occupied by the elderly and registered disabled to prevent burglary, hate crime and domestic abuse;
- Reducing incidence of repeat burglary and re-victimisation;
- Promoting awareness of fire safety, detection and prevention;
- Offering reassurance and advice on crime reduction, and sign-posting other agencies that may be of assistance to clients' particular needs; and,
- Providing practical skills and advice to help prevent online fraud.

The funding is requested to secure the homes of eligible clients in Melksham. The Trust will carry out security and fire risk assessments, followed by the installation of appropriate security hardware to all eligible clients. This now installing heat alarms in kitchens, in addition to carbon monoxide alarms and smoke alarms in the rest of the house. New products making homes safer are always investigated and where appropriate used so that our clients remain as safe and secure in their own homes as possible.

The grant has paid for the security hardware installed in 18 homes in Melksham.


Please give details below of the ways in which the award has been of benefit to the work of your group and how this benefits people of Melksham as stated on your original application

Due to the ongoing uncertainty around seeing clients safely face to face we continued with out telephone and digital advice for 2021.

We have dealt with 2,038 issues for the people of Melksham where we have give full advice. We have helped 168 households claim for Universal Credit, and 154 with a claim for Personal Independence Payment. We also helped 45 households with fuel debt, and more than 100 households with a range of other debt issues.

60% of clients were female, 7% were disabled and a further 48% had a long-term health condition. 95% of clients were White British.

You can see a summary of the issues that we helped with below.



Nationally agreed modelling shows below the average return for every £1 invested in advice clients directly benefit by £10.90. We therefore estimate that this grant has resulted in direct income or debt savings of more then £65,000 for the people of Melksham. Much of this money will be spent in the local community and on essential items.

We have helped 480 households with 2,038 issues, this is approximately 1,200 adults and children

4. Has last year's grant been spent in accordance with its purpose as requested last year? (please circle)

5. Is there anything else that you would like to say regarding your grant?
We have been able to support nearly 500 households with the direct impact of Covid lockdowns including claiming Universal Credit, Disability Benefit and dealing with debt, employment and housing issues. We know that as the direct impact from the lockdown become less, many households will be impacted by the increasing costs of living. We have published a report which gives some more information about the local impact which you can read on our website here.

Over the next few months we will continue to compile details of local and regional charities who can help support households who are struggling to pay essential bills. We are also able to provide direct energy vouchers to low income households who have a pre-payment metre.
We are as ever grateful to Melksham Town Council for their continued support for us and their residents. This is especially crucial at a time where many households face a serious cost of living crisis and Wiltshire Council continues to reduce support for services such as hours which are able to help in times of greatest need.

Firstly, thank you to the Town Council for your grant this year.

Our Mental Health support group provides a friendly, confidential space for anyone experiencing mental health problems. They bring together people from Melksham with shared experiences to support each other, and provide a place where anyone can feel accepted and understood.

Facilitated by skilled members of our team, everyone's experiences are treated as equally important. The groups can enable people to develop coping skills and feel accepted and understood, improving selfesteem. Supporting others can also improve self-confidence.

This funding enabled us to offer both an online offer and then face to face once Covid restrictions were lifted. We have also changed venue in 2022 to offer more spaces in future.

On average, 8-14 people attend the groups on a weekly basis from our local area, and tend to attend long term, ie over 10 sessions.

Overall benefits for the community include:
Overall benefits for the community include: Supporting better mental health for people who live and work in Melksham Town and surrounding area. Empowering people who experience a mental health problem or emotional distress to make informed choices about how they live and recover. Improving support to ensure people get the right services and support at the right time to help their recovery. Enabling social participation for people with experience of mental health problems. Confidence building leading to full participation in society, for example employment and volunteering. Removing inequality to ensure equal treatment for people who experience both mental health and other forms of discrimination. Provides a safe and friendly place for those experiencing mental health problems and emotional distress.

Weekly 8-14 people in attendance, which equates to estimated 30 people in the year we have helped. (These are drop in sessions, and so exact details are hard to record).

2. The benefits of your grant

Please give details below of the ways in which the award has been of benefit to the work of your group and how this benefits people of Melksham as stated on your original application

Since we were awarded the grant in September, we have been able to run four community hubs in Melksham where we have been able to provide support to blind and partially sighted people. Our Community Sight Loss Advisor for Melksham has continued to provide practical and emotional support during these hubs and through home visits with regards to all aspects of their sight loss. They have been able to provide practical support through demonstrating equipment including daily living aids, provide technology training, trialling of different lighting and magnification, and emotional support through helping people rebuild confidence, and grow social connections. By showing people a range of innovative technology, they have been able to find the right tools for them and their sight loss and by training people to use items effectively, they have been able to help maximise any remaining sight that the individual has. Our community sight Loss Advisor has continued to identify any additional support needs and referred people to our new volunteer befriending service if they were feeling lonely and isolated. Our befrienders have provided over 30 sessions with clients living in Melksham since September.

We have been able to provide individual support to over 20 individuals living in Melksham all of whom would have struggled to manage without our intervention. We have offered support to over 30 individuals. In feedback forms provided in 2021 by clients, 98% rated our services as good or higher, with 79% rating the service as excellent.
