Sensory garden Design and Tender Specification

Report of the Head of Operations

- Purpose of the report. Following the last Asset Management and Amenities Committee
 meeting, it was decided that the tender specification for the Sensory Garden should invite a
 blue-sky proposal from suitably qualified contractors with the guide of an £80k budget and
 some critical features that had been identified by Councillors, incorporating previous work
 that had been done on the project.
- **2. Current Situation.** One of the most important aspects of the work is to remove the spoil generated from the creation of the pathways in King George V Park which has been compacted in the area below the trees along Lowbourne. The other aspects that have been identified are:
- a. Water features
- b. Varied range of seating / benches / stepping stumps
- c. Restore Mosaic either inside or just outside the garden, inviting additional contributions from local clubs and organisations
- d. Meandering pathways in various materials
- e. Sustainable planting perennial / tropical / aromatic/ textural
- f. A mixture of wall-based / trough-based textures
- g. Animal structures concrete?
 - 3. **Financial implications.** A budget of £80,000 has been proposed.
 - 4. **Links to Town Council policies and core values.** The Sensory Garden has been proposed as one of the final pieces of the KGV masterplan and is overdue for consideration and completion.
 - **5. Crime and disorder implications**. It has been suggested that the area be fenced off which would demarcate the area and protect from unauthorised dog ingress. Consideration in the design must be given to avoid new portunity for drug crime.

- 6. **Biodiversity considerations**. It is envisaged that the planting and construction will take note of biodiversity and sustainability as well as arousing the senses.
- 7. Safeguarding. N/A.
- 8. **Recommendations.** The Asset Management and Amenities Committee approve the requirements for the tender specification, making any additions and task the Head of Operations to prepare and issue the tender specification obtaining quotes from suitably qualified contractors, having regard to their trading history and previous projects undertaken, to undertake the works.





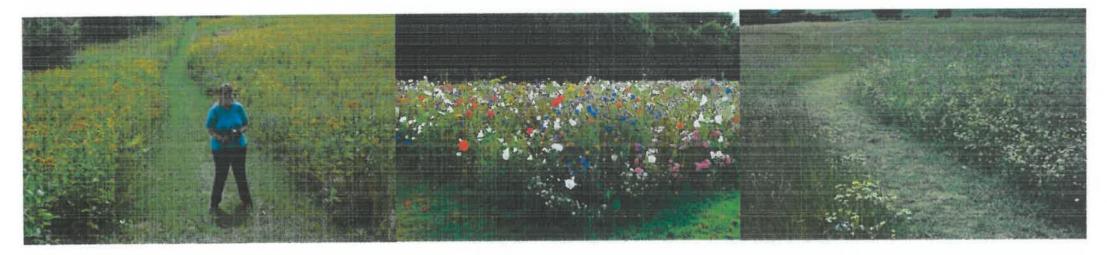
