**175/25 Apologies**

Apologies were received from Councillor Calland.

**176/25 Declaration of Interest**

There were no declarations of interest.

**177/25 Minutes**

Councillor A Westbrook asked about the resolution on Community Toilets. The CEO confirmed a report would come to Amenities & Facilities.

The minutes of 24<sup>th</sup> November 2025, having been previously circulated, were approved as a correct record and signed by the Chair and town Mayor Councillor Rabey.

## 178/25 Public Participation

Resident - I have looked at the MTC Budget for 2026/27 in the Agenda pack and note there appears to be no Grand Total of Income and no Grand Total of Expenditure. Neither is there a report on General Reserves or a report on Earmark Reserves. All these reports are usually considered crucial parts of planning/budgeting. I feel these are needed for transparency and accountability. Do you agree?

I have received a reply from RFO saying he will update spreadsheets for subtotals and make EMR figures available. As yet I have not received these.

Accounting figures on spreadsheets are more prone to errors than software accounting packages. To highlight this point I list a couple of such errors present in the Alternative Budget proposals :-

(i) Page 10 Bottom right. Transposition error £31,605 should be £31,650. Net Expenditure over Income should be £24,650 not £24,605. Total for end columns should be £24,650 not £422 as shown.

(ii) Page 13 final page Weekly household cost

1st Budget 26/27 weekly cost is shown as £59.82 whereas I make it £4.99.

2nd Budget 26/27 weekly cost is shown as £5.42 whereas I make it £3.95.

I feel these accountancy errors would not have occurred if the software accounting package had been used instead of a spreadsheet and I ask if we can revert back to using the software package in future to avoid such errors.

It was noted that the alternative budget was put forward by Councillor Alford, who would not be using the accounting software packages.

Press

Q - Is there a figure for what is in reserves?

A - RFO confirmed not in the document but stated it was £721000 at the end of November.

Q - Park maintenance budget figure for 2025/26 was £70000, with a spend of around £300-£400. Proposed budget is £100000. Is the Council looking to spend £170000 in the next year? If so, how has that been costed?

A – The aim is to refurbish four of the play areas in the next financial year.

Q – If this budget is approved it would be possibly the highest budget ever set in Melksham. Has the Council done any Impact Reporting on what it would mean to the local economy and residents?

A – No. Councillors with experience in the field were working on some communications of where people can find help.

### **179/25      Questions from Councillors**

Deputy Town Mayor Councillor J Westbrook – The disposal of the Dog Agility Equipment was not put to Council. Where alternative options looked at? What valuation was put on the equipment? Why were councillors not given the opportunity to discuss the matter? Can we ensure that going forward the disposal or otherwise of the remaining equipment is discussed by Council?

CEO – The meeting of 12<sup>th</sup> August 2024 was informed that items were not fit for sale. Equipment did not contain a great deal of metal by weight and the valuation was obtained from a local scrap yard. Matter did not come back to council as Financial Regulations 16.5 states “*No tangible moveable property shall be purchased or otherwise acquired, sold, leased or otherwise disposed of, without the authority of the council ... except where the estimated value of any one item does not exceed £500*” .

It also states that a written case will come back to Council and this was planned for the next Finance, Governance & Performance meeting. Officers felt they were able to make a decision operationally. Financial Regulations will need to be changed if Councillors wish to make a decision on all disposals.

Councillor Cleary – Surely would need to use purchase price rather than scrap price.

CEO – Not under the Financial Regulations.

Councillor Alford – How often does this happen?

CEO – This is the only incidence since she has been with the Council.

Councillor Alford – When old tech is replaced is it stored or disposed of by contractor?

CEO – Further discussion is needed to update Asset Register etc. Confirmed that there has been a general clear out of items that were of no value but were taking up storage space.

### **180/25      Town Mayor’s Announcements**

The Town Mayor Councillor Rabey praised the fantastic efforts of all involved in the Christmas Light Switch On and other recent events. She also thanked the Melksham Independent News for its coverage of the event.

The Town Mayor read out a statement regarding comments made at the meeting of the Amenities & Facilities Committee meeting on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> November 2025. The Chair of that committee, Councillor A Westbrook, expressed her disappointment that she had not had prior notice of the statement.

### **181/25 Reports from Unitary Councillors**

Councillor Alford – Recent Full Council meeting discussed proposed transfer of Castle Place car park ownership and a council tax premium for 2<sup>nd</sup> home ownership. Both of these were defeated.

Councillor Griffin – The proposed Aldi development had been called in.

Councillor Stoke – Congratulations to Melksham House who have received a 5 star rating for food and hygiene. Snarltan Farm planning decision appeal will be held next week. Councillor Stokes and Councillor Holder will be supporting the original decision.

### **182/25 CCTV Memory Card**

This item was advanced up the agenda as a representative of the company who had prepared the outside report was present.

Councillor Stokes advised members of the discussions of the CCTV Working Group and the recommendation that no decision be taken on installing SD Cards pending a further meeting to consider the report and actions to be taken.

Standing Orders were suspended.

Councillors asked questions.

There was discussion of due process, accountability, the installation of the system and technical details of the system and SD cards. Councillor A Westbrook left the chamber during discussion of the contractor.

Standing Orders were re-instated.

It was proposed by Councillor Stokes, seconded by the Town Mayor Councillor Rabey and

**RESOLVED** to delay a decision on SD cards pending discussion of the report.

### **183/25 East Melksham Community Centre**

Councillor Stokes spoke. Result of her Melksham East survey – 100 responses, 88 in favour of one larger Community Centre. Result of wider survey conducted this week. 82 responses, 66 in favour of one larger Community Centre.

It was proposed by Councillor Stokes, seconded by Councillor A Westbrook and

**UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED** to hand funds for Melksham East Community Centre to Melksham Without Parish Council to build one larger Community Centre on the Blackmore Farm site.

**184/25      Town Centre Parking Scheme**

The predominant view was that if people are using the scheme, it clearly matters.

It was proposed by Councillor Alford, seconded by Councillor Aves and

**RESOLVED** to retain the scheme.

**185/25      Budget 2026/27**

The budget was proposed by Councillor Cleary and seconded by Councillor Griffin.

Councillor Alford and Councillor Price spoke to the proposal alternative budget.

It was proposed by Councillor Alford and seconded by Councillor Price to pass the alternative budget. The proposal was defeated.

It was proposed by Councillor A Westbrook, seconded by Councillor Alford and

**RESOLVED** for the Parking Redemption Scheme be reinstated into the budget at a figure of £1800.

It was proposed by the Deputy Town Mayor Councillor J Westbrook, seconded by Councillor Cleary and

**RESOLVED** to increase the LHFIG budget to £6500.

It was proposed by Councillor Alford and seconded by Councillor Oatley to remove the pump track from the budget. The proposal was defeated.

Councillor Drewett was absent from the chamber during the vote.

**187/25 Welcome to Forest Sign**

It was proposed by the Deputy Town Mayor Councillor J Westbrook, seconded by Councillor A Westbrook and

**UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED**

- To support in principle the installation of a “Welcome to Forest” sign at the proposed location near Rivermead School, subject to land ownership confirmation.
- Approve continued partnership work with the Community Conversations team and Rivermead School on the design.
- Explore options for a third-party organisation to host maintenance responsibilities and hold public liability insurance.
- Receive a further report once land ownership, design, and hosting arrangements are confirmed, prior to final approval for installation.

**188/25 Committee Membership**

As part of the agreement, Peninsula will provide a free pre-onboarding period from February to the end of May 2026. The annual cost of the service will be £8,691.36 plus VAT.

**RESOLVED** to move Human Resources and Health & Safety Services to Peninsula on a four-year contract.

# Introduction

This report is the result of an independent technical review of the video surveillance system owned and operated by Melksham Town Council (hereafter referred to as MTC).

The review has been actioned due to concerns over the systems general operation and a recent event whereby footage pertaining to a critical incident was not recoverable due to system failure.

The official Operation Manual and Specification document issued by the system installer states the system purpose as:

## **The Primary Purpose:**

- To assist in the prevention and detection of crime
- To assist in the promotion of community safety and to reduce anti-social behaviour.

## **The Secondary Purpose:**

- To assist in the management of the main park (KGV Playing Field) including safety.
- To assist in the protection of community assets.

## Initial Meeting

On arrival, I was introduced to David Elms, CCTV Officer for MTC. David is an SIA licenced operative with a valid Public Space Surveillance licence issued by [REDACTED].

David gave a detailed explanation of exactly what was wrong with the system from an Operator perspective and was able to provide logs that he had collated to help identify reoccurring issues, faults and misconfigured elements, that need to be addressed. This information helped to form the foundation of the review and steer the direction of the investigation. **See Annex A for logs.**

A brief analysis of the system identified it was slow to respond, with cameras dropping connection completely or not responding in a timely manner, creating glitchy, blurred, pixelated images. It was confirmed that this has been normal since the installation commenced and was completed in October 2024.

The system is not actively monitored with system operation being limited to a reactive response, rather than actively monitoring public safety and providing real-time support to the authorities.

## The Control Room

The control room is small and tight on space, with filing cabinets located close to the seating position limiting the workable space. If it has not yet been conducted, I would recommend the system operator(s) conduct a DSE Assessment to ensure the workspace and the layout is safe and compliant for the individuals use.

The equipment rack has been installed tidily and attention to detail has been observed in the labelling and supporting documentation.

There are multiple Network Video Recorders (hereafter referred to as NVR or NVRs) installed, each being controlled independently at device level via separate human interface devices. This method of operation is disjointed and is not ergonomic for the user to control. It is advisable to install a PC driven video management software solution as a dedicated review terminal for live viewing and playback of video.

The PC in the rack used as a maintenance PC and for deployable camera access, is running Windows 11 Pro version 24H2, this should be updated to the latest release 25H2.

All firmware should be checked and updated where available.

There was no internet access at the time of the assessment.

# Cameras

## Overview

The system comprises of 77 cameras. 65 cameras by model are documented in the in the manual. We have been able to identify:

- 68 Standard static/turret cameras
- 3 PTZ cameras
- 1 ANPR camera

At the time of the review we found:

**Positioning**

Camera coverage across the town is deemed adequate for the Council’s current requirements. Resolving connectivity issues will provide a better understanding of the visuals and help identify any weakness in areas of interest.

**Audio**

The audio feature is available on several models and is currently active on many of them. There is no requirement for audio monitoring and recording. There is no public notification that audio is being monitored or recorded. This feature must be disabled as soon as possible.

## Wireless Infrastructure

Following the initial meeting with David and having quickly assessed the online status of the cameras, we conducted a visual inspection of the wireless network installation to identify the routes taken to relay the signal back to the Town Hall from the various node points. It quickly became apparent that the Wireless Infrastructure and its configuration is the main cause of the connection and image issues.

Having obtained the credentials for the wireless infrastructure, we were able to connect to Wi-Fi devices, enabling us to identify the configuration and bandwidth availability. There are a couple of devices which do not recognise the issued credentials, obtaining any other known credentials would be beneficial for further investigation and configuration, but are not essential for the purpose of this report.

## Product Selection

Design layout and product selection has been considered, with the implementation of known brands and the deployment of specific models to achieve point-to-point and point-to-multi-point connectivity. Ubiquiti and Ligowave 5Ghz products are clearly visible on lighting columns\* and buildings\*\*

\*Has MTC or the installer sought permission from Atkins for the deployment of cameras and associated Wi-Fi hardware on lighting columns along the public highway?

\*\* There is mention in Operation Manual and Specification document of informal arrangements with St Michael's Church, No16 High Street, No30 & No32 Church Walk, for the installation of Wi-Fi and camera hardware. Has MTC, as documented, setup the necessary direct debits?

## Product Alignment and Positioning

Records indicate that there are a total of 21 wireless pairs (42 devices) operating across Melksham for the purpose of video Surveillance.

Positioning of Wi-Fi antennas in the most part is good and in-keeping with expectations, with a couple of notable exceptions where antennas are back-to-back without sufficient separation. Ideally, in locations where multiple 5Ghz antennas are in proximity to one another, there should be at least 500mm between the units, with 1 metre being the preferred. If minimum distances are not possible, isolation shields should be installed on the impacted antennas and, there should be careful consideration and configuration of frequency selection to avoid overlapping.

## The 5Ghz Frequency Range

Manged by OFCOM, the 5Ghz frequency range is available to all for use with certain stipulations imposed. Heavily adopted in home and business Wi-Fi, its primary purpose in the UK is weather radar which has priority over the entire spectrum. When a weather

radar pulse is detected by a 5Ghz device operating in the DFS (Dynamic Frequency Selection) frequency range, it must shut down for 30 minutes or move to another frequency. The issue comes in congested areas with multiple overlaying 5Ghz devices all trying to move frequency and having to wait for the scan to complete (typically 15 minutes), during which time there is no transmission. If after the checking period, the frequency is still in use, the scan starts again, further delaying reestablishing a connection.

The 5Ghz frequency range is split into Bands:

<b>C</b>	5725MHz	5850MHz	Outdoor (FWA)	4000mW (4W)	Licensed

For an external Video Surveillance System, the permissible range is **Band B 5470Mhz – 5725Mhz and Band C 5725Mhz-5850Mhz with a license.**

Many of the antenna pairs checked during the review were found to be configured to operate within **Band A** and **Band C**. Full confirmation is required from MTC, but it is believed at this stage, MTC has not obtained the necessary licence to operate in the **Band C** frequency range and has not notified OFCOM of the locations where the antennas are installed. This is a legal requirement.

## Adjusting Frequencies

During the review, we attempted to move some of the mismanaged frequencies from **Band A** into **Band B**. Doing so, brought camera 48,55,56,57,59 & 60, which had been offline for some time, back online. However, it did not improve the performance of devices further down the line where interference and alignment are negatively impacting on performance.

## The 60Ghz Frequency Range

Many installations are now moving away from 5Ghz infrastructure and opting for 60Ghz, as this provides up to a Gigabit bandwidth connection with minimal interference, allowing for smooth uninterrupted transmission, with (depending on model) a 5Ghz fall-back, if needed.

## Upgrading to 60Ghz

Given the number of 5Ghz nodes running back-to-back and, the available frequency range, it is our recommendation, that the 5Ghz antennas acting as the “Spine” from the Town Hall up to Sainsbury’s Roundabout are replaced with 60Ghz links. This would require a more detailed assessment of the current physical setup at each location.

## Licensing 60Ghz

The licensing for 60Ghz Wi-Fi devices in the UK involves the Spectrum Access: EHF licence, which is required for outdoor point-to-point solutions that use this frequency. The licence fee is £75, renewable every five years, and it covers unlimited installations within the selected frequency range. Devices with an output power (EIRP) between 40dBm and 55dBm, or with antennas with a 27dBm maximum transmit output, must have this licence to operate. Typically, the antennas Smart Integrated Solutions specify fall below the licensing requirement, but we maintain records and have a license should there be any feedback from OFCOM.

## Edge Recording & Automatic Network Replenishment

When deploying cameras across a wireless infrastructure, it is recommended to install and activate **edge recording** in the head of cameras to ensure camera recording continues if primary transmission to the NVR fails. This ensures, for the period permitted on the installed media, the camera will continue to record (providing there is not a power issue at the camera location). If the offline period does not exceed the capacity of the installed media and start to overwrite data (First in First Out), upon reestablishing connection, the data missing from the NVR is uploaded from the affected camera(s) using a process called Automatic Network Replenishment (hereafter referred to as ANR) allowing a continuous timeline to be reviewed, where necessary. It is worth noting, the

ANR transfer process relies on the presence of a steady connection with sufficient bandwidth available to allow transmission of live video whilst uploading the data to the NVR in the background.

The cameras connected to this system do not have edge recording enabled, and the NVR is not configured for ANR. It is strongly advised that this be remedied immediately. It would be advisable to conduct this work as part of the physical camera service Smart Integrated Solutions Limited are due to undertake.

#### **Automatic Network Replenishment**

The bandwidth will vary, depending on IP camera, NVR and network's performance. The maximum bandwidth is 10 Mb/s for each channel. Single NVR allows up to 2 channels in replenishment process simultaneously.

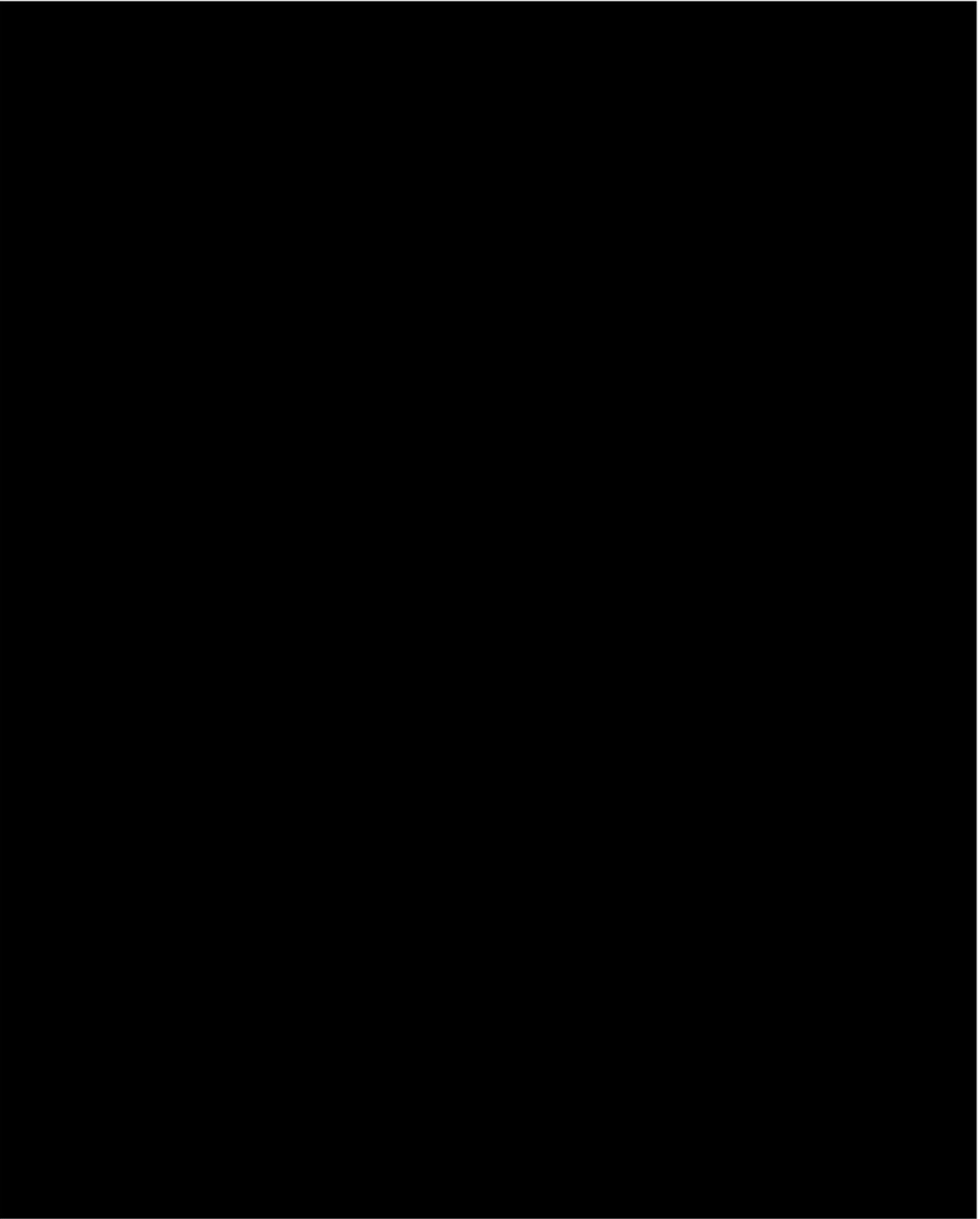
## **Next Steps**

It is advised that MTC request quotes:

1. for SD cards to fitted to cameras and action this ASAP.
2. for upgrading the 60Ghz antennas from the Town Hall to Sainsbury Roundabout and action this ASAP.

Smart Integrated Solutions to continue with proposed service to review the physical installation of antennas and identify the exact requirements for upgrading the Wi-Fi to resolve connection issues.
